Director Notes



The Fantasticks is the longest running musical in history, spanning 42 years and 17,162 performances, followed by a second 11-year run with an additional 4,390 performances. For comparison, the longest running Broadway musical is The Phantom of the Opera, which ran "only" 35 years and for 13,981 performances. Phantom is known for its lavish sets and costumes, its 29-piece orchestra, and the famous chandelier. Fantasticks has a piano and a cardboard moon.

How, then, did this modest show end up holding that record? Theater is littered with flash and spectacle, in both successful and less-than-successful productions. What Fantasticks offers, though, is something different. The story is timeless; boy meets girl, feuding families, love conquers all. Of course, we know life is rarely so simple. Often, we find that what we took for granted wasn't what it seemed. That the things we thought we wanted turned out to be different than we expected. That to appreciate what we have, sometimes we need to experience struggles as well. This is what The Fantasticks provides, a heart that can only be embraced once you've stripped away the excess.

The Fantasticks invites us, as it has for over half a century, to "try to remember" the good times, even when today or tomorrow might be harder. It reminds us that nothing in life is easy and simple, and if it is, it's probably not worth holding onto. And it reassures us that no matter what challenges we may be facing, September will return soon enough.

Creative Team

Paul Smith

(*Musical Director*) – A recent transplant from the OTHER bay area, San Francisco, Paul Smith is splitting his time between both coasts. Harvey Schmidt & Tom Jones

Composer Harvey Schmidt and lyricist Tom Jones are the legendary writing team best known for shaping the American musical landscape with their 1960 hit, *The Fantasticks*. After its Off-Broadway opening in May 1960, it went on to become the longest-running production in the history of the American stage and one of the most frequently produced musicals in the world.

Their first Broadway show, *110 in the Shade*, was revived on Broadway in a new production starring Audra MacDonald. *I Do! I Do!*, their two-character musical starring Mary Martin and Robert Preston, was a success on Broadway and is frequently done around the country. At their theatre workshop, they created *Celebration*, which moved to Broadway, and *Philemon*, which won an Outer Critics Circle Award. *The Show Goes On*, a musical revue featuring their theatre songs and starring Jones and Schmidt, was presented at the York Theatre, and *Mirette*, their musical based on the award-winning children's book, was premiered at the Goodspeed Opera House in Connecticut. In addition to an Obie Award and the 1992 Special Tony Award for *The Fantasticks*, Jones and Schmidt were inducted into the Broadway Hall of Fame at the Gershwin Theatre, and on May 3, 1999 their 'stars' were added to the Off-Broadway Walk of Fame outside the Lucille Lortel Theatre. In 2012, Jones & Schmidt were honored by being inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame. Tom Jones passed away on August 11, 2023.
